# **Faster accessing of Arrays**

- The upside of arrays is that they can store a lot of data
- The downside of arrays is that they can store a lot of data
- What do you do if you want to access all of it?






# **Iteration / Looping**

- The best way to access all the data in an array is with iteration, also called "looping"
- When you loop through an array you look at each element, usually starting at 0 and ending at the last element





# **Finding the Average**



- What would you do if you wanted to find the average of all the grades?
- Sum up all of the elements and then divide by the number of elements



#### for loop

- We will use a for loop
- The syntax is:


```
for (j = 0; j < array.length; j++){
   //The steps in here are repeated
}</pre>
```



### **Breaking Down the for Loop**

- Start with the keyword for
- 1. Set a variable to the initial value
  - (usually index =0, counter = 0, or i = 0)
- 2. Run a boolean test case (true/false)
- 3. Run the code
- 4. Update your variable, and go back to 2.









```
for (index = 0; index < array.length; index++){
   document.write(array[index]);
}</pre>
```

 If the array has 10 elements, the for loop will run 10 times and stop as soon as index = 10





# **Finding the Average**

    80
    87
    94

```
var sum = 0;
for (index = 0; index < grades.length; index++){
    sum += grades[index];
}
document.write(sum/grades.length);</pre>
```





### Loop breakdown

- Why use grades.length instead of "10"?
- What would happen if you subtracted 1 instead of adding 1?
- What would happen if the condition was set to index <= grades.length?</li>





#### Review

- Looping is used for much more than arrays!
